Dear People of God at St. John's,

There is a river that flows out in the middle of the desert, and it flows in and between two different lakes. As it flows into the first lake, the most striking thing you notice is the abundance of life all around it. All along the shores of this first lake are green trees and flowering plants. Multi-colored fish swim just beneath the water's surface and various kinds of birds skim the top of it. There are fishermen in their boats and families with children playing on the shores. In the very midst of this harsh landscape, this first lake's coolness and refreshment is enjoyed by them all.

The river continues to flow... out of this first lake, and after about 50 miles, it empties into the second lake. The difference, however, is startling. There, you see no plants, no fish, no birds... nothing. Why? Because nothing flows out of this second lake. The river literally dies right there.

The river, by the way, is the Jordan, which runs through the Holy Land, and where John baptized the masses.

The first lake is the Sea of Galilee... where Jesus stilled the storm, where he fed the multitudes, where the disciples lived and fished, and where, today, it continues to teem full of life.

But the second lake doesn't allow any of the river's water to continue to flow. It keeps it all to itself, trapping it. And it has become so salty that it is actually poisonous to any living thing. Not surprisingly, it is called the Dead Sea.

Although fed by the one and same river, the image of these two lakes speaks a real truth about our living, and about our life in God... both as individuals and as a congregation.

What do we do with all the good gifts that flow into our lives? Do we celebrate God's goodness and abundance and allow all which God gives us to continue to flow through us? Or do we get stuck in "scarcity-thinking" and choose to keep it all for ourselves?

And what do we do as a congregation? Do we dare to risk a "mission" style of thinking and doing that allows for new life to grow and blossom? Or are we too content to remain stuck in a "maintenance" mode, and in old patterns, even though they impede the flow of grace? And (dare I name it again?) is it still too easy to continue to feed the same old strife that has consumed St. John's for decades now, despite its poisonous effects?

Just inside this issue of Tidings, on the back of this page, you'll find a copy of an old Sunday morning Bible Study handout I created back in my previous congregation for the 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B. Its focus was on the Second Reading appointed for that day. <u>Using it as your guide</u>, I strongly encourage you to commit intentional time, prayer, and conversation with others during this month, focusing on that particular passage of Scripture.

In order that God may once again fill us... here at St. John's... to overflowing.
