
First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

The visionary message presented in this reading focuses on a future day when God establishes a universal reign of peace. Divine decisions will make war obsolete, and the worshiping community responds: "Let us walk in the light of that Lord now!"

¹The word that Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. ²In days to come the mountain of the LORD's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be raised above the hills; all the nations shall stream to it. ³Many peoples shall come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths." For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. ⁴He shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. ⁵O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the LORD!




Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

Paul compares the advent of Christ to the coming of dawn. We live our lives today in light of Christ's coming in the future.

¹¹Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹²the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; ¹³let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. ¹⁴Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

The Holy Gospel: Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus describes his second coming as a sudden, turbulent event that will bring about deep change to our normal, day-to-day lives. Therefore, he urges people to stay awake, be aware, and wait expectantly, because the Son of Man will come unannounced.

The good news of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. Matthew: **Glory to you, O Lord.**

[Jesus said to the disciples,] ³⁶ About that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. ³⁷For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. ³⁸For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, ³⁹and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. ⁴⁰Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. ⁴¹Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. ⁴²Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. ⁴³But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. ⁴⁴Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."




Offertory Prayer

Come, Holy Spirit.


All praise and glory are yours, Holy One of Israel, Word of God incarnate, Power of the Most High, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Let the Children Come

The first Sunday of Advent provides an opportunity to remind children that a new church year begins today. Create a large black-and-white pie chart (the bigger, the better) with the seasons and holy days outlined in black. Prepare matching colored paper or fabric wedges to affix to the chart. Add a new colored "pie piece" at the start of each new season, or invite the children to help you assemble the entire color wheel during a children's message or in Sunday school. Consider making it out of sturdy cardstock, laminating the pie pieces, and attaching hook and loop fasteners so the wheel can be used and handled repeatedly and frequently. Like the Advent wreath, the circular calendar helps children to visualize the cyclical and eternal nature of the Christian life.

Theological Reflection

Today's passage from Romans calls us to commit to a life of restraint, avoiding "reveling and drunkenness debauchery and licentiousness . . . quarreling and jealousy." For many people, these things have become rather a hallmark of the "holiday season," with parties, family gatherings, and gift exchanges sometimes calling forth the worst in human nature. Given that Advent was, at one time, more of a penitential season to prepare us for the return of Christ, worshipers might be invited to reflect on how they might intentionally practice "giving up something for Advent"—perhaps the temptation to drink or eat too much, get into familiar family arguments, or overspend on gifts.

Liturgical Calendar Commemorations

Francis Xavier, missionary to Asia, died 1552 Tuesday, December 3, 2019

A native of the Basque region of Spain, Xavier became a missionary to India, Southeast Asia, Japan, and the Philippines. He also helped to found the Society of Jesus (Jesuits).

John of Damascus, theologian and hymnwriter, died around 749 Wednesday, December 4, 2019

A monk in an abbey near Jerusalem, John wrote many hymns as well as theological works. One of his works, The Fount of Wisdom, remained influential for centuries.

Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, died around 342 Friday, December 6, 2019

Little is known about Nicholas, except that he was a bishop in present-day Turkey. According to legend, he was famous for his giving to the poor, and so has become a symbol of anonymous gift-giving.

The Artwork of the Week

The rededication of St. John's sanctuary last Sunday highlighted some of its most important features including the pulpit and lectern. These represent the "Place of the Word"- where the Word of God is delivered to the assembled congregation. The lectern features a beautiful carved angel with folded hands, suggesting the attitude with which the word of God should be heard. The pulpit is carved with figures of the four evangelists- Matthew, the winged man; Mark, the winged lion; Luke, the winged ox; and John, the winged eagle. Like the baptistry and Last Supper carvings, the lectern and pulpit are the work of Alois Lang, a master carver born in Oberammergau, Bavaria who came to the United States as a young man. Lang joined the American Seating Company in 1903 and was responsible for ecclesiastical carvings in many American churches, including St. John's.
