

WORD

God speaks to us in scripture and preaching; we respond in profession of faith and prayer

First Reading: Isaiah 35:1-10

The prophet describes the return from the Babylonian captivity as a joyous procession to Zion. God's coming reign will bring a renewal of creation in which health and wholeness will be restored. There is no need for fear, for God is coming to save.

¹The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus ²it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the LORD, the majesty of our God. ³Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees. ⁴Say to those who are of a fearful heart, "Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you." ⁵Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; ⁵then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; ⁷the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes. ⁸A highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Holy Way; the unclean shall not travel on it, but it shall be for God's people; no traveler, not even fools, shall go astray. ⁹No lion shall be there, nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there. ¹⁰And the ransomed of the LORD shall return, and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

The farmer waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. ⁸You also must be patient. Strengthen your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is near. ⁹Beloved, do not grumble against one another, so that you may not be judged. See, the Judge is standing at the doors! ¹⁰As an example of suffering and patience, beloved, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord.

The Holy Gospel: Matthew 11:2-11

John the Baptist expects the Messiah to bring God's judgment upon the earth (Matt. 3:11-12). From a prison cell, he wonders whether Jesus is the one who will do this. Jesus' response indicates that God's reign is indeed being fulfilled already through healing and restoration.

The good news of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. Matthew: **Glory to you, O Lord.**

²When John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing, he sent word by his disciples ³and said to him, "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?" ⁴Jesus answered them, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: ⁵the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. ⁶And blessed is anyone who takes no offense at me." ⁷As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? ⁸What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. ⁹What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. ¹⁰This is the one about whom it is written, 'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you.' ¹¹Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he."




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
Offertory Prayer

Come, Holy Spirit.


All praise and glory are yours, Holy One of Israel, Word of God incarnate, Power of the Most High, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Let the Children Come

By the third grade, many children are able to read a Bible passage clearly and meaningfully. Today's poetic reading from Isaiah, with its short, straightforward lines, may be just right for a young person to proclaim to the assembly. The reading's many images will capture the attention of children: a desert in bloom, God's glory and majesty, strengthened hearts, sight and hearing restored, burning sand and thirsty ground becoming a pool of water, and more. In the midst of it all is a royal path to God's kingdom, almost like Dorothy's yellow brick road but without the fearsome ravenous beasts. Children need the same practice adults need before reading publicly. In addition, they might need a stool and a good microphone. Teach them how to introduce the reading and to allow silence for reflection following the reading. Instruct them to close with the phrase "The word of the Lord" so the assembly, including the children, can respond "Thanks be to God."

Theological Reflection

For what do we hope in this Advent season and, more importantly, for whom? The question John asks from prison is common to generations of Jesus' followers: how do we discern the Savior's presence when Jesus' work can be so different from our expectations? In a sermon on Matthew 11 titled "The Gift of Disillusionment," Barbara Brown Taylor says, "Blessed are those who do not let the Messiah they are expecting blind them to the Messiah who is standing right in front of them" (*God in Pain: Teaching Sermons on Suffering* [Nashville: Abingdon Press, 1998]).

Liturgical Calendar Commemorations

Katharina von Bora Luther, renewer of the church, died 1552 Friday, December 20, 2019

Born to an impoverished nobleman, Katie eventually took vows as a nun, but around age twenty-four she and several other nuns who were influenced by the writings of Martin Luther left the convent. Six children were born to Katie and Martin.

The Artwork of the Week

The sanctuary window above the altar is a fine example of work by the Von Gerichten Art Glass Company of Columbus, Ohio. From its founding by Theodore and Ludwig Von Gerichten in 1891 until it closed in the 1930s, the company designed and fabricated stained glass windows for places of worship throughout the United States.

The sanctuary window represents the Holy Trinity. The left panel, dedicated to God the Father, includes a verse from Isaiah. "I the Lord, the first, and with the last, I am he." The medallion below the inscription includes the six pointed star symbolizing the days of creation. The risen Christ fills the center panel representing God's work of redemption through his son. Below the image of Christ is the phrase, "O death, where is thy sting, O grave, where is thy victory." On the left panel, below the inscription, "For as many are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God," is a medallion of the descending dove representing God the Holy Spirit.

The window was a gift of Mrs. Henry Rilling in honor of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Stumberg. Designers originally proposed that the window depict the crucified Christ, but instead, Mrs. Rilling requested the image of the risen Christ. Together, the altar and sanctuary window provide a dramatic focal for worship at St. John's.
