### Reading: Matthew 3:1-12

In those days John the Baptist came, preaching in the wilderness of Judea and saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is he who was spoken of through the prophet Isaiah:

"A voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him.""

John's clothes were made of camel's hair, and he had a leather belt around his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey. People went out to him from Jerusalem and all Judea and the whole region of the Jordan. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River.

But when he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to where he was baptizing, he said to them: "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce fruit in keeping with repentance. And do not think you can say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' I tell you that out of these stones God can raise up children for Abraham. The ax is already at the root of the trees, and every tree that does not produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire.

"I baptize you with water for repentance. But after me comes one who is more powerful than I, whose sandals I am not worthy to carry. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor, gathering his wheat into the barn and burning up the chaff with unguenchable fire."

This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. ### **Reading: A Candle of Peace**

Through the lighting of candles, the Advent season allows us to prepare our hearts and minds for the celebration of the birth of our Savior Jesus. Is your heart filled with peace? Do you have peace with your friends, neighbors, family, or most importantly, yourself? We need to know that there are two kinds of Peace in our lives: inner peace and peace with others.

Inner peace starts with God, and it grows as we focus on His strength and allow Him to take a part in our lives. Where we may have weaknesses and fallbacks, His strength perseveres and grants us inner peace. Take, for instance, the following verse from Isaiah: *You will keep him in perfect peace who's mind is focused on You because He trusts in You*. Now, put that verse into your own words: *God will keep me in perfect peace as my mind focuses on Him and trusts Him.* Where you may feel anxiety or inner turmoil, trust in God to guide you, as He will guide you on this journey of Advent.

Creating peace with others may be easier than we perceive it to be. Reflect on the following verse from Matthew: *Blessed are the peacemakers for they will be called the children of God.* Peace with others starts when we know that God has asked us to be peacemakers in our world. What steps can you take to healing our broken relationships? Can an apology be made with a coworker or friend? We can bring peace to our world one heart at a time. Carry your candle, run to the darkness, seek our the hopeless, take your candle, and go light your world.

## Let the Children Come

The peaceable kingdom was a favorite subject for Quaker minister and painter Edward Hicks, who created at least sixty-two paintings of this messianic prophecy. Check your local library to see if they have art prints or art books of Hicks's work, and bring a poster or coffee table book that illustrates the comforting and vivid prophecies of Isaiah in today's Old Testament reading. You may also print two of Hicks's peaceable kingdom paintings, which are in the public domain, at the websites for the National Gallery of Art and the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Display the artwork on a beautiful small table or stand where the assembly will see it as they enter the worship space. Children will readily take in the comforting concept of ordinarily discordant animals living together in friendship in God's promised new world.

## Theological Reflection

Sometimes our repentance is nothing more than our attempt to avoid punishment, whether it's getting sent to the principal's office or to hell. Other times our repentance is the realization that we truly wish we had not done what we did, and we pray we never do it again. We often follow repentance with confession and the question "Will you forgive me?" This can easily become a request that the person we have wronged let go of their hurt so we can feel better. Repenting and confessing without asking for forgiveness can be extraordinarily hard—but it signals that our primary concern is not our feelings of guilt or shame, but the well-being of the other. It might be interesting to keep the confession of sin during Advent but refrain from immediately asking God's forgiveness—an exercise in emphasizing God's will for restoration rather than our desire to escape condemnation.

## Liturgical Calendar Commemorations

#### Lucy, martyr, died 304 Friday, December 13, 2019

Lucy was a young Christian of Sicily who was martyred during the persecutions under Emperor Diocletian. Her celebration became particularly important in Sweden and Norway, perhaps because the feast of Lucia (whose name means "light") originally fell on the shortest day of the year.

#### John of the Cross, renewer of the church, died 1591 Saturday, December 14, 2019

John was a member of the Carmelite monastic order, and worked to reform it. His writings reflect a deep interest in mystical thought and meditation.

## The Artwork of the Week

All the furnishings designed for St. John's by the American Seating Company are exceptional, but the altar- the table of the Lord- is the centerpiece of worship. The front panels of the altar show the sacred monograms of the alpha and omega (signifying that our Lord is the beginning and the end of all things) and the IHS symbol (the abbreviation of the Greek word for Jesus).

Above and in back of the altar, the *reredos* (carved screen) features the work of Alois Lang, the American Seating Company's master carver. An ornate molding of grapes and leaves frames the inscription, "Abide in me and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine, so neither can ye, except ye abide in me." Above this is Lang's fine carving of the Last Supper. Lang was known for his depictions of Michelangelos's masterpiece. Other examples are located in Grafton, Iowa, St. Louis, Missouri, La Grange, Illinois and Great Falls, Montana. St. John's Last Supper carving was evaluated and treated by noted wood conservator, Robert Marshall, in early 2019.
