


First Reading: Job 19:23-27a

Job suffers the loss of children, wealth, and health. Accused by his companions of wrongdoing, he knows himself to be innocent. Here, in the midst of his suffering, Job clings to the radical hope that his vindicator, his redeemer, lives; and that one day he himself will see God.

²³"O that my words were written down! 


Second Reading: 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

Paul writes to encourage the church at Thessalonica in a time of confusion and opposition. Here, the confusion concerned the return of Christ. Paul writes to those who were allowing their concern over Jesus' imminent return to divert them from the central teachings of the gospel.

¹As to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we beg you, brothers and sisters, ²not to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by spirit or by word or by letter, as though from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord is already here. ³Let no one deceive you in any way; for that day will not come unless the rebellion comes first and the lawless one is revealed, the one destined for destruction. ⁴He opposes and exalts himself above every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, declaring himself to be God. ⁵Do you not remember that I told you these things when I was still with you?

¹³But we must always give thanks to God for you, brothers and sisters beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the first fruits for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and through belief in the truth. ¹⁴For this purpose he called you through our proclamation of the good news, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. ¹⁵So then, brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter ¹⁶Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and through grace gave us eternal comfort and good hope, ¹⁷comfort your hearts and strengthen them in every good work and word.

The Holy Gospel: Luke 20:27-38

The Sadducees, who do not believe in the resurrection of the dead, try to trap Jesus. They formulate the convoluted case of a serial widow who marries a succession of seven brothers. Jesus responds by teaching about God, to whom all are alive and in whom all relationships are fulfilled.

The good news of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. Luke: **Glory to you, O Lord.**

²⁷Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to [Jesus] ²⁸and asked him a question, "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies, leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother. ²⁹Now there were seven brothers; the first married, and died childless; ³⁰then the second ³¹and the third married her, and so in the same way all seven died childless. ³²Finally the woman also died. ³³In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had married her ³⁴Jesus said to them, "Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage; ³⁵but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. ³⁶Indeed they cannot die anymore, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. ³⁷And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. ³⁸Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive."


Great Thanksgiving


(Intoned) Through him, with him, in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, Almighty Father, now and forever. **Amen.**

Let the Children Come

Talking about heaven is difficult because we cannot fathom what it is like, but in today's gospel Jesus doesn't shy away from the subject. God's eternal order doesn't equate to how we relate to one another on earth. Often people take sides, create hierarchy in relationships, and play favorites. Children are sometimes pawns in the relationship negotiations of adults. In talking about heaven, children can be assured that all are included, loved, and favored in God's new order. How does this change the plea in the Lord's Prayer "on earth as in heaven"?

Theological Reflection

The complexity of the question the Sadducees ask in the gospel reading mirrors the complexity of marriage itself today. The assembly will no doubt ruminate on the institution as it pertains to those married, those no longer married because of death, divorce, or tragedy, those longing to be married, and those happily single. As we head toward the holiday season, reflect on how the church can honor all the varied and complex questions that surround marriage. Poetry can help the assembly do this in ways both humorous and serious, from Steve Scafidi's "Prayer for a Marriage" (in *Sparks from a Nine-Pound Hammer* [Baton Rouge: LSU Press, 2001], 55) to Leo Dangel's "After Forty Years of Marriage, She Tries a New Recipe for Hamburger Hot Dish" (in *Good Poems*, Comp. Garrison Keillor [New York: Penguin, 2002], 136). How can we be sensitive and honest when addressing this topic?

Liturgical Calendar Commemorations

Martin, Bishop of Tours, died 397 Monday, November 11, 2019

Martin's pagan father enlisted him in the Roman army. Approached by a beggar, Martin cut his cloak in half and gave part to the man, whom he later understood as representing Christ. He asked to leave the army, but was jailed instead. After his release, he became a preacher, and later a bishop.

Søren Aabye Kierkegaard, teacher, died 1855 Monday, November 11, 2019

Kierkegaard was a Danish theologian whose writings also gave rise to the modern philosophy of existentialism. He frequently attacked the complacency of the state church of his day, as well as its desire to be accepted by polite society rather than be a stumbling block.

The Artwork of the Week

Moving from the choir toward the altar on the right side of the church, the fifth window recalls Christ blessing the children. This window is located in the west transept overlooking the original baptistry which also features a carving of the same episode in the life of Christ. "Let the children come to me, and do not prevent them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." The window is dedicated to the memory of Jacob Hotz, who lived nearby on Lafitte Street with his sister, Fredericke, and her husband, Henry Rilling. The Chruch and Faith windows, in the opposite, east transept, are dedicated to the Rillings, underscoring the strong family ties among first generation German members of St. John's.
