

## First Reading: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Today's reading builds on the common ancient Near Eastern metaphor of the king as shepherd. Judah's unjust rulers have caused their people, their "flock," to be scattered. Nevertheless, the Lord will raise up a new and righteous shepherd who will rule a restored Judah.

<sup>1</sup>Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the LORD. <sup>2</sup>Therefore thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock, and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. So I will attend to you for your evil doings, says the LORD. <sup>3</sup>Then I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. <sup>4</sup>I will raise up shepherds over them who will shepherd them, and they shall not fear any longer, or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing, says the LORD. <sup>5</sup>The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. <sup>6</sup>In his days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. And this is the name by which he will be called: "The LORD is our righteousness."



# Second Reading: Colossians 1:11-20

An early Christian hymn praises the mystery of the political, personal, and mystical Christ, the one who was present at creation and is eternally reigning with God.

<sup>11</sup>May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully <sup>12</sup>giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. <sup>13</sup>He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, <sup>14</sup>in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins <sup>15</sup>He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; <sup>16</sup>for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. <sup>17</sup>He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. <sup>18</sup>He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. <sup>19</sup>For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, <sup>20</sup>and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

# The Holy Gospel: Luke 23:33-43

Amid scoffing and slander from those who sarcastically call him Messiah and king, Jesus reveals that to be Messiah and king is to give one's life for others. Here he uses his power to welcome a despised sinner to paradise but puts his own death into God's hands.

The good news of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. Luke: **Glory to you, O Lord.** 

<sup>33</sup>When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. <sup>34</sup>[Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing."] And they cast lots to divide his clothing. <sup>35</sup>And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" <sup>36</sup>The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, <sup>37</sup>and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" <sup>38</sup>There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews." <sup>39</sup>One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" <sup>40</sup>But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? <sup>41</sup>And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." <sup>42</sup>Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." <sup>43</sup>He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."




# **Great Thanksgiving**



# Let the Children Come

Sarcasm and mockery are not easily understood by children. This isn't a time to teach children about a christology that sees Christ as victorious over death by being mocked and killed on the cross. The gift for children in today's readings may be in the Colossians text: "the image of the invisible God" (Col. 1:15). Children know "invisible." They are the ones stealthily moving through an adult-centric world, and they are the ones enjoying the delights of imagination in story, where a character like Harry Potter can don an invisibility cloak. For children, how is this invisible God made known?

# **Theological Reflection**

Among the three lectionary readings there are a host of images that interpret and clarify the image of Jesus as king: shepherd, cosmic Christ, firstborn of the dead, crucified one, head of the body, image of the invisible God, and many more. Using a variety of these images in the music and words for worship will draw the assembly's vision of Christ beyond a narrow and literal view of human kings. These images together illuminate Jesus' great power over life and creation itself yet also his humility and care for the least

# The Artwork of the Week

The baptistery is located in the west transcept to the right as you face the altar. This is where baptisms were traditionally held following completion of the church in 1932. The centerpiece of the baptistery is an ornamental wood carving (reredos) by Alois Lang, the artisan who completed other works in the church, including the Last Supper above the altar. The baptistery reredos, donated by Mrs. Dora Stumberg, depicts Christ blessing the children. As originally planned, the baptismal font sat in front of the carving on a low raised platform. In later years, the font was moved to the center of the sanctuary in front of the altar. The font, which was sculpted from Carrara marble by artist and monument maker, Frank Teich for the 1886 church, is still used for baptisms today.

# Liturgical Calendar Commemorations

# Justus Falckner, died 1723; Jehu Jones, died 1852; William Passavant, died 1894; pastors in North America

## Sunday, November 24, 2019

Not only was Falckner the first Lutheran ordained in North America, but he published a catechism which was the first Lutheran book published on the continent. Jones was the Lutheran church's first African American pastor and carried out missionary work in Philadelphia which led to the formation there of the first African American Lutheran congregation (St. Paul's). William Passavant helped to establish hospitals and orphanages in a number of cities and was the first to introduce deaconesses to the work of hospitals in the United States.

#### Isaac Watts, hymnwriter, died 1748 Monday, November 25, 2019

Thought by many to be the greatest hymnwriter in the English language, Watts as a youth was critical of the quality of the metrical psalter of the time. He wrote about 600 hymns—many based on the psalms, but others that are not.

#### Andrew, Apostle

#### Saturday, November 30, 2019

The first of the disciples to be called by Jesus, Andrew quickly began to bring others to the Savior, including Simon Peter. The Bible also shows him leading some Greeks to meet Jesus, and he brought forward the boy with five loaves and two fish, with which Jesus fed thousands.
