The Holy Gospel Matthew 22:1-14

The good news of Jesus Christ according to St. Matthew: **Glory to you, O Lord.**

¹Once more Jesus spoke to them in parables, saying: ²"The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. ³He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. ⁴Again he sent other slaves, saying, 'Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet.' ⁵But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, 'while the rest seized his slaves, mistreated them, and killed them. ¹The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. ¹Then he said to his slaves, 'The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. ¹Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet.' ¹¹Those slaves went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests.

¹¹"But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe, ¹²and he said to him, 'Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?' And he was speechless. ¹³Then the king said to the attendants, 'Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.' ¹⁴For many are called, but few are chosen."

Great Thanksgiving

The Lord be with you. **And also with you.**

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is indeed right, our duty, and our joy, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks and praise to you, Almighty and Merciful God, through Jesus our Christ, who, on this first day of the week, overcame the powers of sin and death, opening to us the way of everlasting life. You have made us to be a holy people, claiming us through the waters of Baptism and marking us with the sign of the Cross.

For on the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying:
This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin.
Do this, as often as you drink of it, for the remembrance of me.

Every time we eat this bread, our brokenness is mended; every time we share this cup, we receive that grace which transforms us; every time we come to this meal, we proclaim the One who gives us life:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

With this bread and cup, our Lord Jesus gives us his very self, that we who share in Christ's body and blood may live as a people of new life, and on the last day stand and be counted among the saints in light. **Amen.**

Through him, with him, in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and forever. **Amen.**

Remember us, Lord, in your kingdom, and help us to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.
